Chair s'Message...



First and foremost, I want to wish everyone and their families a happy, safe and restful holiday. It has been an interesting year with multiple challenges in our personal, clinical and academic lives. It was remarkable seeing the transformation from inperson encounters to virtual meetings. There was tremendous strain on our hospital and university systems but so many of you demonstrated resiliency and resourcefulness.

The most exciting news from the Faculty of Medicine was the \$250 million donation from James and Louise Temerty. This is the single largest gift in Canadian history which "will support discovery, collaboration, innovation, equity and student well-being across the University of Toronto's Faculty of Medicine and its affiliated hospital network, advancing its leadership as a global centre of excellence in human

health and health care". In gratitude for this extraordinary benefaction, the University's Faculty of Medicine will be named the Temerty Faculty of Medicine. Congratulations to Dr. Eric Monteiro who was selected as the inaugural Assistant Program Director following a rigorous nomination and selection committee process.

Medicine (T-CAIREM) was recently launched
at the University of Toronto's St. George campus. The new Centre solidifies Toronto's place
as a world leader in the fields of artificial
intelligence (AI), data science and the health
sciences.

Professor **Muhammad Mamdani** has been appointed the Director of T-CAIREM for a five-year term. "Toronto is uniquely positioned to lead globally in artificial intelligence in healthcare," says Mamdani. "Our expertise in medicine and allied health sciences, computer science, statistics, mathematics, and engineering is among the best in the world. The goal of T-CAIREM is to create a forum that brings together this multidisciplinary expertise so members can share their experiences and collaborate through common interests and a cutting-edge data and compute environment that will transform healthcare in innovative and exciting ways."

T-CAIREM's work will focus on three pillars: Research, Education, and Data Infrastructure. The centre brings together some of North America's brightest researchers, including:

Research co-leads: Professor Anna Goldenberg (Computer Science/SickKids) and
 Professor Mjaye Mazwi (Pediatrics/SickKids)

• Education lead: Professor Laura Rosella (DLSPH) and learner co-leads

Vinyas Harish (MD/PhD student) and Felipe Morgado (MD/PhD student)

• Infrastructure co-leads: Professor Sean Hill (Psychiatry/CAMH) and

Dr. Alistair Johnson (Computer Science/SickKids).

The T-CAIREM team is launching several initiatives this month for students in undergraduate, graduate and professional programs. The Trainee Rounds, aimed at graduate students across faculties as well as MD students, will give selected students the opportunity to showcase their work to leaders in the AI and healthcare research communities. In addition, a Summer Research Studentship Program will pair undergraduate and medical students with a U of T faculty supervisor to explore AI in medicine.

Two \$200,000 <u>Temerty Innovation Grants for AI in Medicine</u> will be awarded for up to two years to multidisciplinary teams working on projects with the potential to transform healthcare using AI over the coming decades.

Accreditation 2020

The Committee on Accreditation of Canadian Medical Schools (CACMS) On-site Accreditation Visit was rescheduled to November 2 - 6, 2020. Information can be found on the MD Program website here: https://md.utoronto.ca/ https://md.utoronto.ca/ https://md.utoronto.ca/cacms-visiting-team-2020.

The accreditation visit was conducted remotely, utilizing videoconferencing technology for meetings with faculty, staff, and students. Because of the virtual nature of the visit, a one-day follow-up visit was also scheduled for December 7, 2020.

An on-site visit typically begins with an introductory conference with the visiting team on a Sunday evening, and continues for three to four days. During an on-site visit, the team meets with a wide range of participants from across the MD Program, Faculty of Medicine, and clinical and community affiliates.

In the first stage of the virtual visit process, the visiting team will restrict its conversations to those individuals/groups who can provide additional, detailed information on specific CACMS elements that require more in-depth investigation.

The second stage of the pilot visit will consist of a one-day follow-up, to allow the visiting team to provide any final details needed to complete the report, or to conduct a more in-depth investigation of issues that may have arisen during the first stage of the visit.

All virtual visit meetings will take place in an online teleconferencing platform.

At the end of the on-site visit, the team presents a summary of their findings to Faculty of Medicine and University of Toronto leadership.

The team will then compile a Site Visit Report. The Site Visit Report will be based on the DCI, MSS, ISA, and conversations from the on-site meetings. The Site Visit Report will then be provided directly to the CACMS for review.

The CACMS will make their decision on the University of Toronto MD Program's accreditation at their June 2021 meeting. The MD Program expects to receive the final decision shortly thereafter.

Electives

All electives programs for visiting international students for 2021 have been suspended.

In addition, the Canadian visiting electives program has also been cancelled nationally at least until July 2021.





Blake Raggio


I have relocated to the southern United States with my wife and two young daughters and am currently working as a Facial Plastic & Reconstructive Surgeon in Montgomery, Alabama.

Humanitarian Outreach

Face the Future Foundation

As with so many other activities, our Face The Future humanitarian surgical missions to less developed countries are being curtailed by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Our planned mission to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in November 2020 has been postponed. Nonetheless, our team has kept in communication with our colleagues and have been supporting them virtually with advice on challenging cases. There is also an educational webinar series being developed to engage the faculty and residents in the maxillofacial surgery program at Addis Ababa University until such time we can mount our next mission.

Our planned missions to Nepal and Rwanda early in 2021 may also need to be postponed, in which case virtual educational series are also being developed.

On a very positive note, Face The Future Foundation has been the recipient of a substantial donation from Nicole Crimi, a second-year medical student at McMaster University. Nicole created the concept, and has written and illustrated a children's book titled "Patty and the Pandemic." (www.pattyandthepandemic.org). The book tells the story of Patty and her friends and how they can empower themselves to practice safe public health measures, while still enjoying each other, during the pandemic. The book has been very well received by the public and by the Government of Ontario, which is promoting the book to school boards. Nicole has had many media appearances and virtual readings for children aged 3 to 8. Dr. Adamson supported her efforts and wrote the Forward for the book. Nicole wished all proceeds from the book to benefit children, and has generously designated Face The Future as the recipient of her book's success.
